INTRODUCTION

The 2023/2024 Cost of Attendance (COA) budget has been developed using a number of resources including: information from the Bureau of Labor Statistics, USDA, Beaureau of Transportation Statistics, and the IRS. In addition to this information, DEC has collected data from a cohort of students that are included in the IPEDS Fall Enrollment 2015. By utilizing these resources, DEC has created a weekly budget for students who live with parent(s) with no dependents and for all other students. This has resulted in incremental changes from the prior year budget but appears to be in lign with current economic trends and CPI data.

The budget is reviewed and updated biennially. Costs are updated annually or within 60 days of notification and effective date.

Douglas Education Center includes the actual tuition in the COA budgets. Students are invoiced for tuition prior to the start of each semester/term. Budgets for only one semester/term/instructional period include only the tuition for that semester/instructional period. Budgets for the academic year include two semesters/terms/instructional periods of tuition. Tuition charges, by semester/instructional period, are listed in the catalog. Students are informed of tuition increases at least 60 days prior to the increase taking effect. Pell COA budgets are always based on full time enrollment for a full academic year.

Douglas Education Center includes the actual fees, if any, in the COA budgets. Students are invoiced for fees prior to the start of each semester/term/instructional period. Budgets for only one semester/term/instructional period include just the fees for that term. Budgets for the academic year include two semesters/terms/instructional periods of fees, if applicable. Fee charges, if any, are listed in the catalog by semester/term/instructional periods for each program. Students are informed of fee increases at least 60 days prior to the increase taking effect.

BOOKS & SUPPLIES

Douglas Education Center publishes, in its catalog, estimated book, supply and equipment charges by semester/term/instructional period in each program. The estimated amount plus any permissible increases in books and supplies are included in the COA budget. Budgets for only one semester/term/instructional period include just the books and supplies for that semester/term. Budgets for the academic year include two semesters/terms/instructional periods of books and supplies. Book and supplies charges are based on reasonable retail prices. Textbook consumer information is also available on the website.

HOUSING

Douglas Education Center has used data from the Bureau of Labor Statistics, Consumer Expenditures Survey for the Cleveland area to calculate personal expenses. In addition, review of this data is done annualy to determine if adjustments are warranted. Cleveland is the closest metropolitan area that surveys consumers and is in the same region as Pittsburgh, PA. (see BLS Data Tab). The closest BLS Data collection area is Cleveland. This data was reviewed against local rental costs that have been sampled. The BLS data was in lign with the other data collected. Based on prior year information, DEC has determined that the housing allowance for students living with parents with no dependents is approximately 58% of the amount needed by all other students. 41.58% of DEC's All Other students live in BDI housing with average rent of \$616 per month, which includes all utilities. The remaining 58.42% of All Other students have housing arrangements unbeknownst to DEC staff. Information from another, local landlord indicates average rent of \$675 per month. Based on market conditions, DEC has determined average room cost provided by local landlords is in-lign with the data obtained from the BLS. This is comperable to prior years budgets of Housing charges.

Based on prior year information, DEC has determined that the board allowance for students living with parents with no dependents is approximately 46% of the amount needed by all others.

Travel Expenses

Douglas Education Center includes an allowance for travel expenses. Travel expenses include mileage to and from school, parking, other vehicle expenses, and a travel allowance for non-resident students to return home during the academic year. Based on a prior year's survey, 29% of DEC's students may fly home for vacations and family visits with average, roundtrip airfare of \$346 (for average domestic fare, 2018, per the U.S. Department of Transportation Statistics). The other 71% of non-permanent resident students may drive home for family visits. Using data collected from the IPEDS Fall Enrollment 2015 cohort, the average mileage for off campus students is 1027.68. The allowance is based on the average mileage times the IRS standard mileage rate of \$0.575. The travel allowance for commuting for all students is based on 19.95 miles round trip (determined from data obtained on the IPEDS cohort of students) to and from school times 5 days per week, times the IRS standard mileage rate of 575 cents per mile for 2020. In addition to that amount students pay for parking in town. There is also an allowance for other vehicle expenses per the BLS 13/14 Cleveland area data.
